Although the booth's ornate crown was damaged beyond repair, the crown was able to be recast and the intricate details resculpted. Happily for us, a gifted sculptor, Jessica Heikes, had just moved back to Pittsburg after earning an M.F.A. from the University of Massachusetts-Dartmouth. With her strong art and sculpting background to draw upon, Jessica started by creating a mold directly from the damaged crown. "It was a very

interesting project and one that utilized a lot of my skills. Although," she said smiling, "I have to admit, I had never imagined that I would be using my art skills in this direction," smiled Heikes.
