Theatre Spot Light! The historic Hutchinson Fox Theatre opened on June 8, 1931. This theatre



was designed by the Boller Brothers who were well known for constructing grand “movie palaces.” In fact, they were so admired that many lesser known architects designed theatres that have been mistakenly identified as “Boller” theatres: the Colonial Fox, for example. But, I digress. The Hutchinson Fox closed in 1985 and stood empty until purchased by *Hutchinson’s Historic Theatre, Inc.*, in 1990. After a thorough, multi-million-dollar restoration, the Hutchinson

Fox re-opened in 1999. The marquee alone is worth the trip to Hutchinson. I encourage you to make the effort to check it out when you have a chance. The Hutchinson Fox is another fine example of the vibrancy a restored historic theatre brings to a downtown and the surrounding communities.

What an amazing gift it was going from drab to dazzle with help from our friends Tony Vietti and Mike Wood of Vietti Auto Body Shop. The 1930 sconce lights needed to be rebuilt and who else would we go to but a metal expert like Tony Vietti! Tony put his metal artistry to work. Next was to imitate the 1920 metal color scheme.



Mike Wood helped us find just the right combination of paint to replicate their Art Deco feel. Windfall Light Stained Glass, in Joplin, found the kokomo glass needed and Konnie McDowell, of Brent's Electric, rewired the sockets. All that was left was to find the right combination of colored bulbs. The outcome was stunningly restored sconces to add a touch of beauty to the stabilization phase that was happening at the time. The craftsmanship on these restored sconces is extraordinary!
