They successfully renovated the Friso Railway Depot at 4th and Joplin, which operates today as the Frisco Event Center. Their most recent success is the transformation of the old PittCraft building into the Pittsburg Fun Depot. The Fun Depot features a gaga pit, arcade games, a climbing wall, other fun inflatables, an interactive floor projector and a bar where drinks and light food will be served. These attractions will be cycled out for newer ones as time goes on to prevent



the attractions from becoming stale. Larry and Sookie also included various historical details in the renovation, including an old bell, previously graced in the Hallmark headquarters on the Plaza in Kansas City and an old camera, also featured in the Smithsonian National Museum of American History. Where is it going?! Not to worry, the Fox Marquee will return, better than ever. However, to save it from further deterioration and to make necessary repairs to the magnificent terracotta details of the grand arch entrance, we had to remove and store our treasure. When it came down on March 28, 2013, suddenly something that hadn't been visible to Broadway since the 1920s was revealed - the original grand arch entrance. Yes, original. You may not know the Colonial Theatre that Broadway without a marquee when it



opened in 1920. The first marquee was installed circa 1930 and remained until it was replaced by the Midland Theatre marquee, which adorned the Midland Theatre, directly across the street from the Colonial. The "MIDLAND" letters where replaced with "FOX" letters and the rest, as they say, is history! B&R Services, (Greg Blancho) carefully removed the Fox marquee. Greg tells of a special connection to the Colonial Fox. He worked as a projectionist, but was often tasked with changing the marquee letters.

Did you know? The first dwelling in Pittsburg was built by J.T. Roach in July 1878, and the first business house, a General Store, was erected around the same time by G.W. Seabury & Co. By the fall of 1878, Pittsburg boasted 100 inhabitants.
