The adorning feature of the Colonial Fox grand entry is the 1920 ticket booth. Unfortunately, the booth's ornate crown was damaged beyond repair. After consulting with numerous restoration professionals, we realized the crown needed to be recast and the intricate details resculpted. Happily for us, Jessica Heikes had just moved back to Pittsburg after earning an M.F.A. from the University of Massachusetts-Dartmouth. With

her strong art and sculpting background to draw upon, Jessica started by creating a mold directly from the damaged crown. "It was a very interesting project and one that utilized a lot of my skills. Although, I have to admit, as an artist and a sculptor, I had never imagined that I would be using my skills in this direction," smiled Heikes.

Why restore the Colonial Fox?

Early on in this wonderfully rewarding project, I learned how important the restoration and rehabilitation of historic theatres have been to downtowns across America. This is not about the building or even arts and entertainment. It is about community building and a sense of place. Downtown theatres are the heart of a community. Restored historic theatres increase the number of visitors downtown and draw new businesses to accommodate them. Just one of many great examples of this renaissance effect on downtowns is the Granada Theatre in Emporia Kansas.
