Although you cannot see it from the street, the Colonial Fox Theatre has undergone some significant changes in the last two years – moving her closer to the final goal of restoration. The condition of the roof was shocking.



We had to replace many more rotten joists than we anticipated. In fact, probably the only thing that kept the old fan house from falling 30 feet onto the historic theatre seats below was the six inch accumulation of tar paper and asphalt. And on the west and south walls the mortar was just barely holding the bricks together.

Thanks to the commitment of the people who support the Colonial

Fox Theatre Foundation each year with contributions ranging from \$25 and up to \$1000, all that has changed. Now we have a beautiful state-of-the-art roof. Furthermore, our historic bricks have been re-pointed with mortar that is a perfect match to the original color.

Contributions received from the Friends of the Colonial Fox Theatre Foundation go directly to the restoration fund. We needed just under \$150,000 for the roof and tuck pointing project. We received \$91,000 from the



behind-the-scenes, yet crucial, stabilization project. We are losing historic material in the theatre at a rapid rate because of the continued dampness. It is not coming from the roof anymore, but we still have water entering the basements causing a seriously damp environment. Once again, the State of Kansas Heritage Trust Fund and the Pritchett Trust Fund have committed \$90,000 and \$30,000, respectively, toward the project which is estimated to cost \$165,000. We have high hopes that our Friends will come through with

We knew it was there, but who knew what a difference it would make to the look and feel of the performance house. If you haven't seen the Grand Old Lady since her original proscenium arch has been revealed, you are missing an awesome visual experience.

Mike Joyce, one of the original group of contractors who spearheaded the campaign to save the Colonial Fox Theatre, coordinated the revealing of the old proscenium arch. After studying the situation, Mike rounded up Dave McLaren, David Gee and John Kutz and together they tackled this amazing uncover project. In less than three hours this amazing group of crack carpenters removed the halfcentury-old sheet rock that had been hiding the beauty of the original arch.

Troy Blair Construction and R Quip Rental provided the scaffolding for this work that took place 30 feet above the theatre floor. The project was an remarkable feat and one that coordinator Mike Joyce touted as another example of the ownership that the entire community feels for this theatre.

Wow Is the best way to describe the accomplishments of a motivated group of people in a small amount of time. Thanks to the hard work of our volunteers, the theatre has been cleaned and refreshed and ready for a new season of tours!

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# Gheatre Vocabulary Backstage

Does the word conjure up images of stage hands manipulating scenery, or actors waiting in the wings for their entrance cue? Do you imagine dressing rooms full of costumes, stage makeup and the strong aroma of grease-paint?

Whatever image the word brings to mind we can thank the Greeks for its origin.

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Greek theaters were outdoors and composed of three parts: the orchestra, the skene (backstage), and the audience. The skene was the place where actors went to change costume and prepare for their next appearance. Stage design evolved to include the proscenium arch and any area behind the arch, including what is hidden from the audience's view, is now referred to as backstage.

So far, most of what is happening with the Colonial Fox Theatre project could be considered backstage. Our restoration phases to date have been out of sight—a new roof, new tuck-pointing, grant writing, project research. The next step in the restoration process, de-watering the basements, will also be mostly out of sight.

However, rest assured that what is happening backstage will soon come to light. Crawford and Cherokee Counties' last remaining theatre from the grand old era of vaudeville and silent movies will once again shine her splendor on and off Broadway.
