Sweet Saturdays

Many of you have shared your memories of the Saturday matinees. According to one matinee fan, the admission was nine cents (in the 50s), and for that you could see the double feature, news reels, and

weekly serials such as

Sky King. The memory tells of the Colonial Fox as a great place to spend time with friends, enjoying that buttery who popcorn, Jujubes, and malted milk balls. One movie attendee wrote that she came to the Colonial Fox in the 1960s for the five cent frozen pickles see a local band perform one Saturday. Another woman could care less about the sweet and sour treats. She was

too busy chasing boys. She exclaimed, "I could not miss a Saturday." She

arrived each week with her girlfriends to meet the boys and then stay for the late show, which got out around midnight. These night owls didn't have a corner on the fun. Early birds enjoyed Saturday morning stage shows at the Colonial Fox. An individual

attended the Colonial Fox in the 1940s explained to us that you could participate in a cracker eating contest and see a movie for twenty five cents. The contest required one to eat four and cups of pickle juice. She also got to crackers and then whistle. Luckily this girl was able to squeak out a sweet tweet. She won a Roy Rogers cap pistol and holster for her "airs."
